## **Crudgington Primary School PE and Sports Funding 2016 -2017**

### **Overview:**

The Government is providing funding of £150 million per annum from the academic year 2016/17 until 2020 as part of an Olympic legacy fund, to provide 'new, substantial primary school sport funding'. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to primary school headteachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children.

The sport funding is ring fenced and can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

"Maintained schools and academies must publish, on their website, information about their use of the PE and Sport Grant allocation by 4 April 2017. Schools should publish:

- i) the amount of grant received;
- ii) how it has been spent (or will be spent) and
- iii) what impact the school has seen on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment as a result, to help to ensure that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles."

### **Crudgington Primary School Vision for PE**

For all children in the school to experience high quality curriculum physical education (PE), school sport and physical activity that will lead to life-long participation and love for sport.

### **Aims:**

- 1) To improve the health and wellbeing of pupils at Crudgington Primary School
- 2) To provide and or facilitate high quality opportunities and outcomes in sport.
- 3) To assist each individual child to reach and fulfil their potential including the overcoming of barriers to participation in PE & sport.
- 4) To encourage and stimulate more involvement in physical activity by the children and the ir families within the wider community.
- 5) To promote lifelong learning, active participation and excellence in sport.
- 6) To raise achievement and support excellence.

### **i). Amount of grant received**

#### **Primary School Sport Funding: Who receives the funding?**

All state-maintained secondary schools, academies, middle schools, special schools (including non-maintained special schools) and pupil referral units which have primary aged pupils (as reported in the 2016 school census) will receive funding.

#### **Amount of funding per school - a breakdown**

### **Basis of allocation**

Allocations for the academic year 2016 to 2017 are calculated using the number of pupils in years 1 to 6, as recorded in the January 2016 census, as follows:

- schools with 17 or more pupils receive £8,000 plus £5 per pupil
- schools with 16 or fewer pupils receive £500 per pupil

For example, a school with 16 eligible pupils would receive £8000. One with 12 would receive £6000 and one with five eligible pupils – the smallest that we know of – would receive £2500.

**Crudgington Primary School currently has 127 children on roll which equates to a funding grant of £ 8,635**

### **How the funding will be paid?**

The payments will cover the total funding for the academic years 1 September 2016 to 31 August 2017. The allocations for each eligible school in the authority will be set out in a spreadsheet that will accompany the note on the conditions of grant for the initiatives being supported by the AGS.

Academies will receive their AGS directly from the Education Funding Agency (EFA).

Eligible special schools will receive their funding directly from the Department's special education needs and disability division.

### **Accounting for the spending**

Schools will be held to account for how they spend the sport funding. Ofsted will strengthen its coverage of sport and PE within the inspection handbook and supporting guidance, so that schools and inspectors know how sport and PE will be assessed in future as part of the overall provision offered by the school.

### **Accountability**

Schools will be held to account for how they spend the PE and Sport Premium. Ofsted will strengthen its coverage of sport and PE within the Inspectors' Handbook and supporting guidance, so that schools and inspectors know how sport and PE will be assessed in future as part of the overall provision offered by the school.

Schools will be required to include details about their sporting provision on their school website, alongside their curriculum details, so parents can compare sports provision between schools, both within and beyond the school day.

### **Best practice**

Schools will be able to draw on information on effective practice taken from case studies provided by the very best schools. One year on, Ofsted will carry out a survey reporting on the first year's expenditure and its impact.

## **ii). How the PE & School Sports Funding has been (or will be spent)?**

The PE co-ordinator has outlined how the PE & School Sports Funding grant will be used in the School PE action plan. The plan outlines how we intend to hit the 7 key factors which are to be assessed by Ofsted:

- **Curriculum PE** (CPD needs, Curriculum plan, Assessment, breadth of offer, Teaching & Learning)
- **Out of School Hour Clubs** (Traditional Sports, Inactive pupils / Change 4 Life, Including coaches)
- **Competition** (Level 1 - Intra School, Level 2 Inter-school)
- **Leadership & Volunteering** (Playground leaders, School Sport Organising Crew)
- **Gifted & Talented / Disability**
- **School Club Links**
- **Links with other subjects that contribute to pupils' overall achievement and their greater spiritual, moral, social and cultural skills (SMSC)**
